## Health & Safety in the Playground



Please remember that you and your children must dismount bikes or scooters when coming into the school grounds. All bikes and scooters must be parked carefully in the bike shelter. This is to prevent unnecessary incidents as many parents have toddlers, babies and buggies.

Please also note that no children are to be left unattended in the playground before school without a responsible adult and we would ask that you do not arrive too early on the playground for the start of your child's school day. School gates will open at 8.40am.



For those of you who have a dog, please do not tie them to the school gates or railings, even in the car park. May we respectfully remind you that dogs, including those being carried in arms, are not to be brought onto the school site. Whilst we can see this is a dilemma, we all know that some dogs are not always predictable and the procedure at Trafalgar is that it is better to be safe than sorry.



May I also remind you that, in accordance with the signs up around our premises, smoking is not allowed anywhere on the school site at any time. This includes e-cigarettes and vapourisers. Please also avoid smoking near the school gates.

## School Uniform



The children have returned to school looking very smart. They are a credit to the Trafalgar community, thank you. We believe that wearing school uniform by all children gives a positive image of the school as well as a sense of belonging for the children. As we approach the colder months, the sections below act as a reminder of what the children of Trafalgar wear for the autumn and winter. We appreciate your co-operation in supporting us with this.

**Girls** grey pinafore dress, skirt or grey trousers, white blouse/collar or polo neck; school sweatshirt or sweat cardigan or dark green cardigan; if tights are worn in the winter, they should be green, grey or black.

**Boys** grey shorts or trousers; grey or white shirt/collar or polo neck; school sweatshirt or dark green pullover; grey or black socks.

**PE Kit** green shorts with a white or school t-shirt. PE kit should be put in a drawstring bag, clearly named. Jewellery should not be worn and long hair tied back.

### Suitable Footwear

Both boys and girls should at all times wear black, brown or navy shoes that are of a suitable style, except for PE lessons when all children should wear black plimsolls or trainers with elastic or Velcro fronts.

**Please, please** remember to label your child's school clothes - in particular PE kits, coats, jumpers and cardigans.

With our Reception children still mastering the school routine, it would be incredibly helpful if every item was clearly named so that items are easily identifiable. Your assistance would be greatly appreciated.

Please come and look in the blue lost property 'bin' if your child has mislaid anything. Unnamed items that have not been claimed are regularly recycled.

## *Please remember .....*



A polite reminder that due to food allergies, we do not allow children to hand out special occasion treats from the classroom after school.

## *No Nuts*



Please be aware that products containing nuts could be a risk to other children in school with a nut allergy, so please avoid giving your child anything containing nuts to eat in their snack or lunchbox. Thank you.

## *Communication*



This is simply to remind new and existing parents that we believe effective communication is one of the keys to a successful school. In order to resolve any issues, worries or queries you may have about your child's learning or behaviour, your first port of call is your child's class teacher. Should there be a need to set up an informal meeting with your class teacher, this will be at a mutually agreeable time and can be arranged by calling in after school or phoning the School Office. If the query is complex and needs more time, the Year Group Leader will be involved after the first meeting if necessary. If the problem still is not resolved, the Deputy Headteacher or the Headteacher will become involved. Therefore, to summarise:
