Visit of Dental Nurse to Reception Classes



Reception were lucky to have a special visitor on Thursday morning. Lucie the dental nurse from a local Practice came to talk to the children about how to keep our teeth clean and healthy. We met 'Crocodile' and practised cleaning his teeth. We looked at some photos of healthy teeth and gums and then learnt about the plaque that can form on our teeth if we don't regularly brush.

We enjoyed a story about an imaginary mouse who made our teeth squeak when super clean. We talked about and held the special instruments that dentists use to look at our teeth and talked about how important regular visits to the dentist are.

Finally, we talked about foods that are good for our teeth and those that we need to be careful about not having too much of.
