Year 2 Woodland Time





Year 2 have had a brilliant time in our Woodland area over the last few weeks. They have been learning all about woodland animals; linking in with their Science this term. They have learnt about key characteristics of their class animals: building setts like badgers, learning how to 'fox walk' and using 'Deer Ears' to listen to faraway sounds. We've also learnt some great new woodland games; used sticks and stones as 'tens' and 'ones' to help our addition skills; made clay animals; and re-built our bug hotel.

Some pupil voice:

"We learnt how to fox walk. One step takes 20 seconds because they don't want it to make a sound."

"I loved making the badger sett, it didn't quite go as expected but it was good."

"We built a bug hotel. Bugs like to live in wet places and in soil."

"Me and Scarlett got to lie down and watch the clouds."

Their children learn to focus and share the enjoyment of the story; they learn how stories start and finish, and how a plot unravels and is resolved; they learn that books can transport them elsewhere"

Challenge(s) of the week...

Spend some time thinking about how you and your child(ren) read at home - when, where, for how long etc.

When you sit down to read to your child, or to listen to them read, how long do you tend to spend on this?

Think about how long your child can focus for. This might be different on a school day from a weekend, and it may vary before and after school, or from day to day.

Is there a place that is best/worst for concentrating on a story?

Learning to read is hard work for most children! For many children, it can be better to have a short, focused ten-minute reading session - little and often! What do you think would work best for your child?

Let your child stop reading when they're tired and have had enough - you can always go back to it later. Keep the atmosphere fun and positive, by chatting about what your child is reading and helping them if they get stuck.

Don't forget to give them lots of praise for their efforts!

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
